Captain Tom 100 Maths Challenges:

EYFS did 100 laps of the cycle track in the EYFS playground.



Year 1 stood 2 metres away from a hoop in the playground then took it in turns to try to get 100 beanbags into the hoop. They timed how long it took them.



Year 2 collected 100 natural objects.

There were 24 children in the class, but with our lovely TA Rita, the total came to 25. They calculated there are 4 groups of 25 in 100, so each person would need to collect 4 natural objects from around the school. We put them together to make the number 100

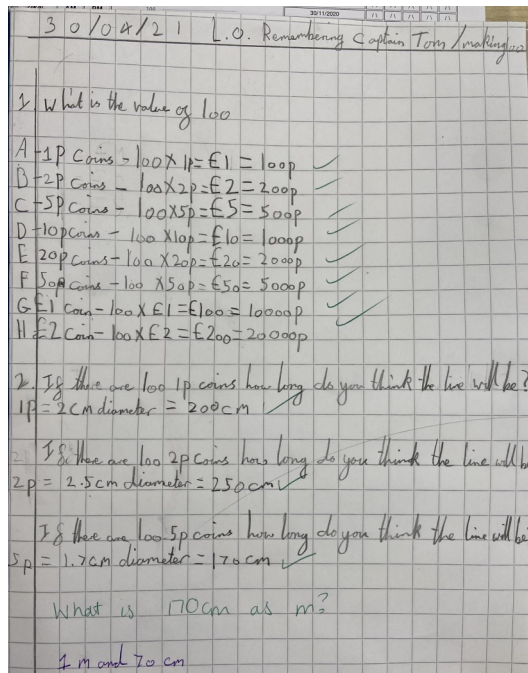


Year 3 placed 100 1p coins side by side in a straight line. They predicted how long the line would be. They also worked out how many 2ps and 5ps were needed to make 100.

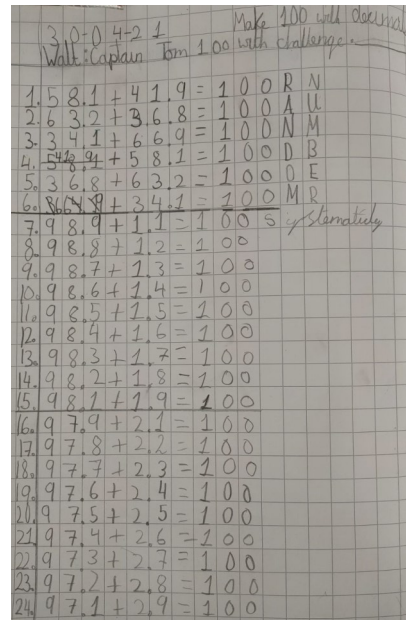


Captain Tom 100 Maths challenges:

Year 4 worked out the value of 100 different coins lined up. In addition, with given diameters they calculated how long the line would be with 100 1p, 2p and 5ps.

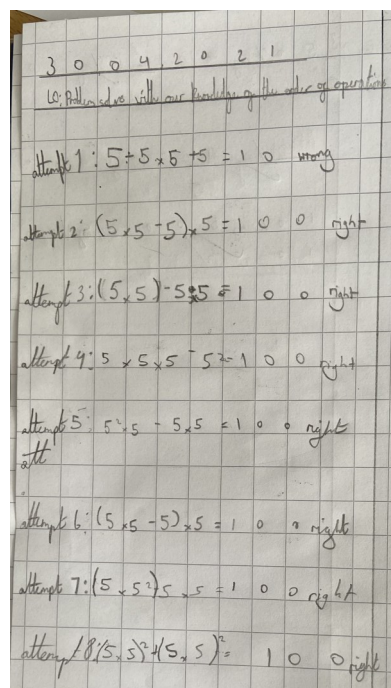
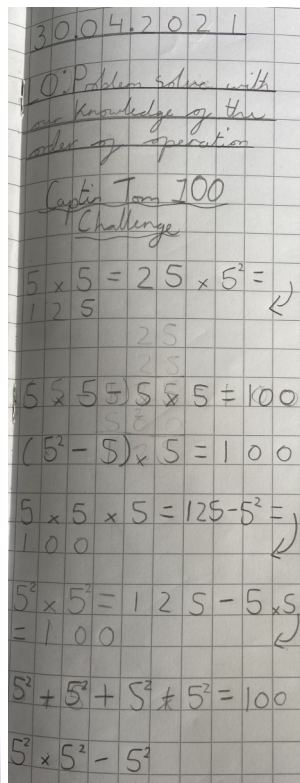


Year 5 made 100 using decimal numbers and any operation. Some chose random numbers, others worked systematically. Special mention should go to Lydia and Freddie who managed to make 100, 100 times!

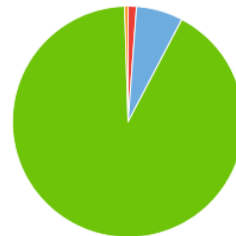


Attendance:
